TITLE II—RECONCILIATION AND RELATED MATTERS

Budget Reconciliation Process

- Budget Committees
- Can include reconciliation instructions.

Budget Resolution

Congress

- House & Senate must agree on joint resolution (not law).
- If reconciliation instructions included.

- Committees must report legislation meeting instructions.
- Omnibus bill on House & Senate floors; expedited procedures (e.g., no filibuster); Conference to President.

Reconciliation

Farm Bill & Reconciliation Brief History Detour

Rec'n converted to an offensive weapon against mandatory spending.

Nearly derails Farm Bill reauth.; Boll Weevil Dems cut a deal... Rec'n passes in conjunction with Farm Bill

Cuts farm program payment acres to 85%

1990

Reconciliation to cut everything from farm programs to food stamps, WIC, and more (Gingrich revolution)

Pres. Clinton vetoes; eventually get 1996 Farm Bill (decoupling).

1995

Dems win trifecta in 2020

Use reconciliation to pass Inflation Reduction Act; includes \$20b for conservation.

Note that the troubled 2014 reauthorization was plagued by budget fights (debt ceiling) after 2010 midterms.

Outside of DC, Either: Status Quo; or In Limbo.

Crop Insurance

Status quo; nothing changes for 2025 crop year

ARC/PLC

Status quo; extended for 2025 crop year PLC reference prices: corn to \$4.26; soybeans to \$9.26; wheat to \$5.56

Conservation

Mostly status quo but less certain overall. Authorized through FY2031 at current levels; TBD on funding freezes or others.

Inflation Reduction Act & Other

Reportedly IRA appropriations are suspended for the time being; federal judge has ordered them unfrozen.

Climate-smart partnerships, research, etc. in limbo.

Attempting An Outlook

Farm Bill Reconciliation Rather Than Reauthorization.



Review: Handicapping the Farm Bill

Reconciliation is a lock (tax cuts & slim majorities).

Including SNAP is also a lock (trillions in offsets likely needed).

Uncertain: what else is included & what happens to the rest of the Farm Bill.

House Budget Committee included instructions for \$230 billion reduction for House Agriculture Committee (over 10 years).

If only SNAP (and IRA/conservation), then all bets are off on reauthorizing farm programs and the rest of a Farm Bill in regular order in 2025 (another extension is most likely).

The Longshot: Reconciliation also includes significant cuts to farm programs, conservation, and crop insurance.

Even Money: Reconciliation cuts only SNAP and IRA/conservation (maybe other conservation as well), but increases farm payments (e.g., reference prices) & crop insurance.

Review: Handicapping the Farm Bill

Budget Hawks vs. Boll Weevils


Reconciliation is a huge omnibus bill with many things to support + President backing

Need for offsets (\$2T to \$4.5T) + debt & deficit challenges Hold the gavels in committees + SNAP cuts may appease Budget Hawks

Farm payment programs generally small \$ in large budget


Slim majorities in both chambers = Republicans need all votes

\$1.4 trillion in mandatory spending in the Farm Bill (over 10 years); 80% of it from SNAP.



Boosting Price Triggers Is Expensive


Projected Changes in Spending, Commodities (Title I) and Crop Insurance; 10-Year Total (FY2024-2033) (CBO)






Reviewing Recent Payment History

Comparing Economic Assistance to Farmers in the Decoupled Era (1996-2024 & 2025 projected)




A Reminder About PLC & Reference Prices

PLC Payments per Payment Acre (85% of Base)




Payment Rates Under ARC-CO

Comparing Farm Assistance: Crop Insurance & Farm Program Payments






